


History - Captain Fletcher and the Navarro Inn

Fletcher Arrives

- Scottish seaman, settler, shipbuilder, provider, and tavern owner
- One of first Anglo-explorers on North Coast with Richardson Party, and first to settle at mouth of Navarro River in 1851
- Sold large part of holdings to Navarro Mill Company in 1861 and town of Navarro born
- **Built Navarro Inn around 1865**, became heart of town through demise of timber mill in great recession of 1893
- Inn served as place or refuge for sailors and other traveling along the coast, providing rooms, meals, supplies and entertainment
- Fletcher lived next door with his family


History - Mill Town of Navarro Grows




Town of Navarro and Navarro River in 1881




Saving Captain Fletcher's Inn


End of Mill Town Period

- Navarro Mill closes in 1893
- Loss of industry, series of devastating fires, floods, and 1906 earthquake destroy town
- Fletcher passes away in 1902 and is buried in Little River Cemetery. Inn remains in family until 1923
- Navarro Inn and Mill Superintendent's House eventually become only remaining structures of town
- Inn continues to serve as roadhouse for travelers along Shoreline Highway and ocean
- Tourist begin to arrive by auto

History - Transformation to Navarro-by-the-Sea

Resort Period

- Inn transformed into rustic tourist destination resort and series of owners over next 60 years
- Cottages added on east side of Inn and row of motel rooms added to accommodate visitors
- Important roadhouse known for steelhead and coho fishing, boating, dining, bar and live music

History - Navarro-by-the Sea

Resort Period

- Ownership of Inn changed hands many times after the Fletcher - Schaeffer period of 72 years
- Ownership included: Gilmore (1923-31), Benkelman/Linn (1931-44), Sholin (1944-48), McCorkle-Wulk (1948-59), Crider (1959-72), Sparkman (1972-73), Beacon (1973-90), and Wingo (1990-96)
- Local sources claimed that Clark Gable and Carole Lombard spent part of their “honeymoon” at the Inn in March 1939



History - Navarro-by-the Sea

Navarro Beach Access

- Starting in the 1960's then owner of Navarro Beach, Robert King, attempted to block public access to Navarro Beach
- In summer of 1966, Mr. King used a bulldozer to install a permanent barrier west of Inn
- Lester and Lotus Dietz, who frequented Navarro-by-the-Sea, filed a class-action lawsuit and won a temporary restraining order stopping Mr. King efforts to block access
- Initially, the Mendocino Superior Court ruled in favor of King, concluding that there had been no dedication of the road or beach, and that widespread public use was not "implied dedication"
- With a donation jar kept on the bar at Navarro-by-the-Sea to help fund legal costs, the Dietz's appealed to the California Supreme Court
- In 1970 the Supreme Court handed down a landmark decision that recognized the long-standing public use of Navarro Beach and deemed the road a public right-of-way
- Dietz vs. King decision set a precedence for public access along the entire coast where established access was not legally dedicated

History – Navarro-by-the Sea

End of Resort Period

- Inn continued operations into late 1980's when complications over management, liquor license, and septic system all when had their toll and forced its closure
- Plans to reopen as Bed & Breakfast in 1990's by Robert Wingo, Set Director for "Murder She Wrote", starring Angela Lansbury as "Jessica Fletcher" - "Navarro-by-the-Sea Inn" featured in script of TV series
- Complications with securing an adequate septic system prevented reopening of the Inn
- Wingo's estate sells to State in 1996 after his passing

History – NSCR Formed in 2000

Push to Save the Inn

- After nearly two decades of neglect, local supporters, lead by Dr. Hillary Adams pushed to save the Inn
- NSCR incorporated as public non-profit in 2000 to work in partnership with State Parks
- Temporary metal roof installed in 2000 to stop water damage with grant from local NGCA
- HS Report completed in 2003 with grant from National THP
- Interior debris removed and Inn weatherized by State Parks in 2004
- NSCR leads volunteer efforts to bring attention to Inn and spearhead critical preservation efforts



Historic Significance of Inn

Official Listings and Important Treasure

- Official Project of Save America's Treasures Program of National Trust in 1998
- Listed on National Register of Historic Places under both Criteria A and C in 2010
- Rare timber plank construction no longer used, last known intact example of its kind
- Spectacular setting along State Highway 1, California's most scenic highway, offering a unique opportunity to interpret the rich natural habitats of the Navarro Estuary and an underrepresented period in California's history – timber era and rustic settlement - and use the historic Inn for this purpose

Approaching Total Loss

- Inn facing complete loss after three decades of neglect
- Foundation completely rotted away and structure was at high risk of collapse in even moderate earthquake
- Vertical support system missing along south wall and southeast corner due to past flooding through building
- Siding buckling and failing, fascia / soffits unraveling, and fasteners rusted and missing
- Additions collapsing and tearing from Inn, allowing water intrusion into building and spread of dry rot and pests

Imminent Danger in 2010 – Threats to the Inn

Failing Cladding and Fasteners

“...Although the Navarro Inn has stood for nearly 150 years, its current condition leaves it extremely vulnerable. Today, many of the structural members – particularly beneath the building – are completely deteriorated, nails and other fasteners are loose, missing or rusted through, cladding and trim is missing or separating from the building, and the additions are collapsing off the building...the Navarro Inn in its current state is at a high risk of extensive damage or total collapse in an earthquake.”

Missing Foundation and Floor Joists

"...It is one of the oldest standing structures on the Mendocino coast and still features much of the historic fabric of its original construction, as well as a very unique history during all of its uses over the last 147 years. Unfortunately, neglect and deferred maintenance over the years have jeopardized the structure to the point that it will likely be a total loss if stabilization is put off any longer..."






Progress and Accomplishments of NSCR

- Critical temporary metal roof installed in 2001
- Extensive Background Studies funded under grant from California Cultural and Historical Endowment (CCHE)
- Secured **\$280,000** CCHE Planning Grant in 2010
- Secured **\$319,695** CCHE Project Construction Grant in 2011
- Leveraged over **\$275,000** in other contributions
- Finished Plans, CEQA MND, Permits
- Built broad community support

Abatement, historic material salvage, demolition and initial earthwork

Saving Captain Fletcher's Inn

Construction Continues in 2012

Inn raised to install new foundation and retaining wall, and repair/replace floor joists



Inn lifted in August 2012 with all excavation supervised by archaeologists – a broad assortment of artifacts were discovered, catalogued and are now on display inside Inn



Original foundation consisted of huge main timber (above) that stretched the entire length of building and supported floor joists



South wall and floor of former kitchen area was rotted away and had to be reframed and completely rebuilt

Construction Continues in 2012 and 2013

New foundation, retaining wall, earthquake retrofitting, and resheathing completed



Drilling and installing 25-foot long reinforced piers for new retaining wall and foundation anchor system at back of Inn



Concrete forms, new foundation, and replacement vertical redwood sheathing

Re-siding entire building following completion of retaining wall and foundation, and resettling of Inn



Historic window openings reframed, earthquake retrofitting shear panels installed, and fills imported around Inn

Construction Continues in 2013






Work Continues Inside and Out
